Long time Edson businessman dies unexpectedly

Long time Edson businessman Abraham Goldstick died unexpectedly in Edmonton on August 27, 1979, at age 71.

Following the retirement of his father Hyman Goldstick, Abraham operated the Workmen's Clothing Store on the corner of Main Street and 4th Avenue where the Bank of Nova Scotia building is now. He was also associated with the late Jack Garvie in operating Edson Hardware next door.

Mr. Goldstick carried on the compassionate and complete men's clothing business started by his father in Edson's earliest years until his moving to Edmonton where he was engag-

ed in various business enterprises.

A Veteran of service with the Royal Canadian Air Force from the start of the Second World War, Mr. Goldstick became a staunch member of the Lions Club of Edson, as well as being instrumental in seeing to the completion of the Royal Canadian Legion building.

A Past Master of Edson Masonic Lodge No. 68, he also progressed through the degrees to become a member of the Edmonton Shrine organization in which he was active in their charitable pursuits.

With his wife Bessie at his side, he was active in everything that made life in his beloved Edson a more

fulfilling experience.

Mr. Goldstick is survived, besides his loving wife Bessie, by his son Miles Goldstick, Shirley Stomosh, Eugene, Wynona of Peace, Dr. Harold Eist, and six grandchildren.

He is also survived by his brother Cecil, Tiger Goldstick and sisters Molly Yochlovitz and Celia Cohen of Edmonton.

Funeral services were held Wednesday, August 29th at 11 a.m. in Chevra Kadisha Chapel, Inlennet Community Cemetery, Edmonton.
