

**MINTZ, DAVID B. (D.D.S.)**

On January 26, 2001, after a lengthy illness, David Mintz, devoted husband, father and grandfather, passed away at the age of 84 years.



Born in Regina, Saskatchewan, October 11, 1916. Graduated in Dentistry at the University of Toronto in 1942, after which he was Captain in the Canadian Dental Corp overseas for two and a half years. Practiced dentistry in Weyburn, Saskatchewan until 1949 and thereafter in Edmonton. In 1982, was appointed a Lifetime Member of the Alberta Dental Association and retired in 1985. Active member of B'nai Brith, of which he was Regional President (Alta-Sask) and local President.

Survived by his devoted wife of 57 years, Clara; two sons, Bruce (Susan), Edmonton and Jack (Eleanor), Toronto; grandchildren, Aisa, Rachel, Lezlie, Avi and Gaele; sisters, Ada Stock and Sally Lax, (Hamilton), and many nieces and nephews. Predeceased by parents, Benjamin and Sonia Mintz; brothers, Alexander and Morrey and sister, Goldy Lande.

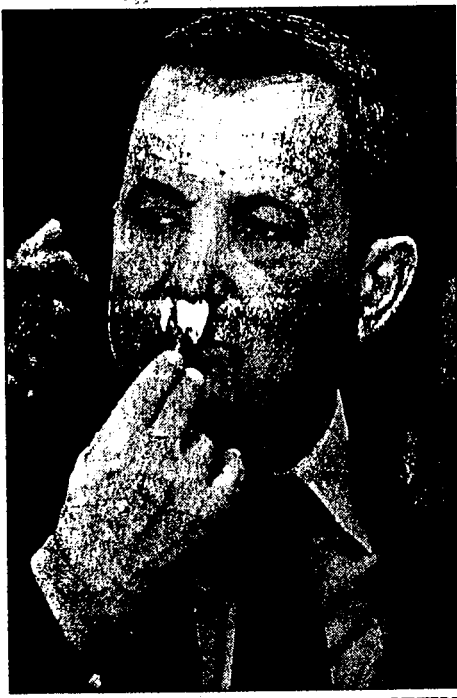

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# Peace talks to resume

JERUSALEM (AP) — Israeli officials have decided to resume peace talks with the Palestinians this afternoon in the Egyptian resort of Taba, Israel radio reported.

Yesterday's decision came a day after Israel suspended the marathon negotiations following the killing of two Israelis in the West Bank.

The two victims, both owners of a Tel Aviv restaurant, were killed by masked gunmen.

Afterward, Prime Minister Ehud Barak recalled the leaders of his negotiating team for consultations. But Barak and senior ministers met at Barak's Jerusalem residence yesterday and decided to resume the peace talks.

The report said the talks were

expected to resume after the funeral of the two Israelis, who were to be laid to rest in Haifa: Barak's office had no immediate comment on the report, which was also carried on Israel television.

The two Israelis, Motti Dayan and Etgar Zeituni, were abducted and shot Tuesday after they entered the West Bank city of Tulkarem looking for supplies for their sushi restaurant, Yuppies, located in a trendy Tel Aviv neighbourhood.

In the past, such killings have led to breakdowns in talks, but Barak is pressed for time due to Israel's Feb. 6 election. Trailing in the polls, Barak had hoped the peace talks would produce a breakthrough and energize his re-election campaign.
